Surds and rationalising the denominator

A LEVEL LINKS

Scheme of work: 1a. Algebraic expressions - basic algebraic manipulation, indices and surds

Key points

- A surd is the square root of a number that is not a square number, for example $\sqrt{2}, \sqrt{3}, \sqrt{5}$, etc.
- Surds can be used to give the exact value for an answer.

•
$$\sqrt{ab} = \sqrt{a} \times \sqrt{b}$$

•
$$\sqrt{\frac{a}{b}} = \frac{\sqrt{a}}{\sqrt{b}}$$

- To rationalise the denominator means to remove the surd from the denominator of a fraction.
- To rationalise $\frac{a}{\sqrt{b}}$ you multiply the numerator and denominator by the surd \sqrt{b}
- To rationalise $\frac{a}{b+\sqrt{c}}$ you multiply the numerator and denominator by $b-\sqrt{c}$

Examples

Example 1 Simplify
$$\sqrt{50}$$

Key points

• $a^m \times a^n = a^{m+n}$

•
$$\frac{a^m}{a^n} = a^{m-n}$$

• $(a^m)^n = a^{mn}$

•
$$a^0 = 1$$

• $a^{\frac{1}{n}} = \sqrt[n]{a}$ i.e. the *n*th root of *a*

•
$$a^{\frac{m}{n}} = \sqrt[n]{a^m} = \left(\sqrt[n]{a}\right)^n$$

•
$$a^{-m} = \frac{1}{a^m}$$

• The square root of a number produces two solutions, e.g. $\sqrt{16} = \pm 4$.

Expanding brackets and simplifying expressions

A LEVEL LINKS

Scheme of work: 1a. Algebraic expressions – basic algebraic manipulation, indices and surds

Key points

- When you expand one set of brackets you must multiply everything inside the bracket by what is outside.
- When you expand two linear expressions, each with two terms of the form *ax* + *b*, where *a* ≠ 0 and *b* ≠ 0, you create four terms. Two of these can usually be simplified by collecting like terms.

Examples

Example 1	Expand 4(3 <i>x</i> –	2)
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Multiply everything inside the bracket by the 4 outside the bracket

Example 2 Expand and simplify 3(x + 5) - 4(2x + 3)

3(x+5) - 4(2x+3) = 3x + 15 - 8x - 12	 Expand each set of brackets separately by multiplying (x + 5) by 3 and (2x + 3) by -4

Factorising expressions

A LEVEL LINKS

Scheme of work: 1b. Quadratic functions - factorising, solving, graphs and the discriminants

Key points

- Factorising an expression is the opposite of expanding the brackets.
- A quadratic expression is in the form $ax^2 + bx + c$, where $a \neq 0$.
- To factorise a quadratic equation find two numbers whose sum is *b* and whose product is *ac*.
- An expression in the form $x^2 y^2$ is called the difference of two squares. It factorises to (x y)(x + y).

Examples

Example 1 Factorise $15x^2y^3 + 9x^4y$

to find the terms in the brackets

Example 2 Factorise $4x^2 - 25y^2$

$4x^2 - 25y^2 = (2x + 5y)(2x - 5y)$	This is the difference of two squares as the two terms can be written as $(2x)^2$ and $(5y)^2$

Key points

- Two equations are simultaneous when they are both true at the same time.
- Solving simultaneous linear equations in two unknowns involves finding the value of each unknown which works for both equations.
- Make sure that the coefficient of one of the unknowns is the same in both equations.
- Eliminate this equal unknown by either subtracting or adding the two equations.

Examples

Key points

• The subsitution method is the method most commonly used for A level. This is because it is the method used to solve linear and quadratic simultaneous equations.

A LEVEL LINKS

Scheme of work: 1b. Quadratic functions - factorising, solving, graphs and the discriminants

Key points

- A quadratic equation is an equation in the form $ax^2 + bx + c = 0$ where $a \neq 0$.
- To factorise a quadratic equation find two numbers whose sum is *b* and whose products is *ac*.
- When the product of two numbers is 0, then at least one of the numbers must be 0.
- If a quadratic can be solved it will have two solutions (these may be equal).

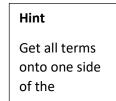

Solving quadratic equations by using the formula

A LEVEL LINKS

Scheme of work: 1b. Quadratic functions - factorising, solving, graphs and the discriminants

Key points

- Any quadratic equation of the form $ax^2 + bx + c = 0$ can be solved using the formula $x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 4ac}}{2a}$
- If $b^2 4ac$ is negative then the quadratic equation does not have any real solutions.
- It is useful to write down the formula before substituting the values for *a*, *b* and *c*.

Examples

Example 7 Solve $x^2 + 6x + 4 = 0$. Give your solutions in surd form.

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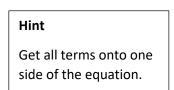

Scheme of work: 1d. Inequalities – linear and quadratic (including graphical solutions)

Key points

- Solving linear inequalities uses similar methods to those for solving linear equations.
- When you multiply or divide an inequality by a negative number you need to reverse the inequality sign, e.g. < becomes >.

Examples

Example 1 Solve $-8 \le 4x < 16$

$-8 \le 4x < 16$ $-2 \le x < 4$	Divide all three terms by 4.

Example 2 Solve $4 \le 5x < 10$

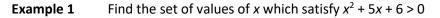

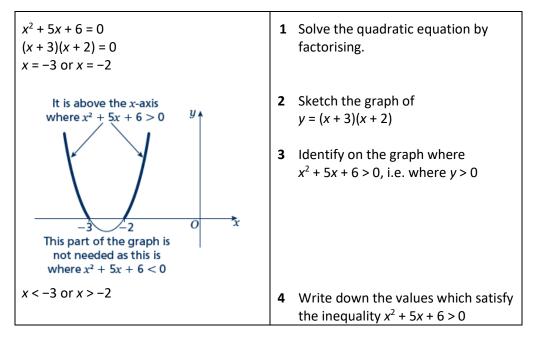
